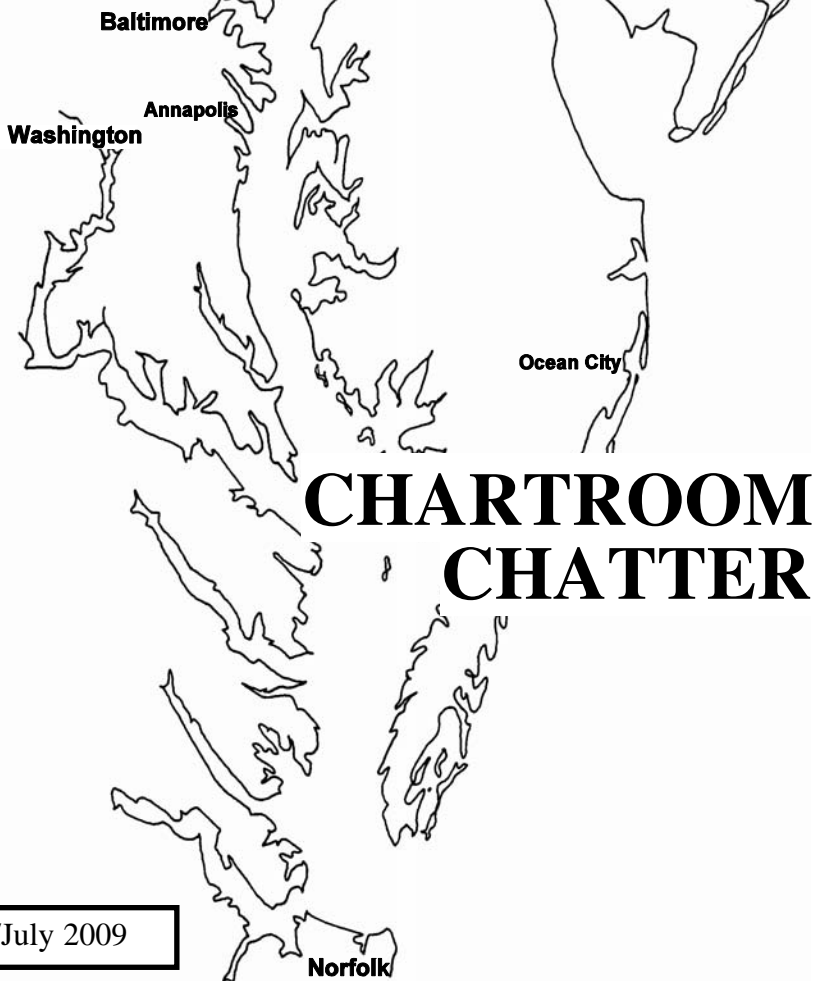

## Legislative Director's Report

On May 12 President Obama signed an Executive Order that called for the federal government to lead the effort to control pollution that flows into the Chesapeake Bay and wildlife habitats. The committee will be chaired by the EPA and include senior representatives from the departments of Agriculture, Commerce, the Interior, Transportation and Homeland Security. We've all seen numerous committees on pollution control before. The difference in this committee is that part of their report needs to show how to expand public access to the Bay and rivers on federal lands. Expansion of public access is a key issue to boaters, who have been losing access in recent years. Also; the committee must submit their report in 120 days. Deadlines are a good thing!

The governors of the six Bay states and the mayor of Washington, D.C. have submitted a letter to Reps. James Oberstar (D-MN) and John Mice (R- Fla.) to include reauthorization of the policy, as part of the Federal Surface Transportation Act, to reduce polluted storm water runoff from federal highway construction projects. When it rains, runoffs from fluid leaks, emissions break linings and tire wear are carried to the nearest sewer and into the waterway. Focus is normally on farmlands but road construction creates a lot of pollution.

DSLPA/NJ/DE Art Friedman will be have had surgery June 15, by the time this is published.. He has been in Pennsylvania Hospital about 9 days. Please keep him in your thoughts and prayers. As you can see he still did his report for CC! He's a strong man and a great asset as a State Legislative Director.

**The Maryland Department of Natural Resources** most exciting programming is to encourage and inspire stewardship. How this is accomplished is through innovative recreational programs offered to citizens in the state. This month, anglers of all ages and experience are searching for "Diamond Jim", the famous striped bass, who will provide the lucky angler with a \$10,000 prize, along with 59 qualifying species eligible for winnings, can enjoy this contest through participating in the 5th annual Maryland Fishing Challenge. Search info on this event on DNR's <http://rs6.net/tv.jsp>? This event was started to enable interest in recreational fishing and stewardship of our waterways and aquatic life. Many Marylanders will (literally) get their feet wet at team WADE IN across Maryland this summer. If you live on the water, you may be interested in learning more about **Maryland Grow Oysters**, a citizen effort to grow out young oysters for planting on local sanctuaries.

### Special Bay News

Maryland Announces Two-Year Milestones, at the May 12 Executive Council Meeting, Governor Martin O'Malley announced new short-term milestones through which Maryland will meet its nitrogen reduction goal of an additional 3.75 million pounds and its phosphorus reduction goal of an additional 193,000 pounds by December 31, 2011. Governor O'Malley also committed to reaching Maryland's current long term nutrient reduction goals by 2020, five years earlier than the 2025 end date agreed to by the other jurisdictions.

### Maryland Scientists Explore Tipping Point

On Tuesday, May 11, Governor O'Malley toured the Bush River with state scientists to learn more about recent trends in water quality and to discuss the "tipping point" in which the targeting of restoration efforts to selected tributaries can reach a point where the natural resiliency of the system serves to compliment and accelerate improvements in its health for the entire Bay watershed.

**President Obama Elevates Bay Restoration Efforts** by creating an Executive Order, a Federal Leadership Committee for the **Chesapeake Bay** to be chaired by the Environmental Protection Agency. The directive calls for a unified federal effort to establish a set of strict of pollution caps backed by state action plans and federal consequences to ensure progress in reducing pollutants that impact the bay through the robust use of existing authorities key funding support, and unrivaled scientific and technical assistance. EPA Administrator Lisa P. Jackson presented the Executive Order during a Chesapeake Bay Program Executive Council Meeting in Mount Vernon."

**Two Clean Marinas Certified in Annapolis-** The Yacht Basin Company in Annapolis and the Annapolis City Dock in Anne Arundel County have been designated the 110th and 111th certified Maryland Clean Marinas. Together with 24 smaller facilities designated as Clean Marina Partners, Maryland now boasts 135 certified facilities. The Maryland Clean Marina Initiative recognizes and promotes marinas, boatyards and yacht clubs of any size that meet legal requirements and voluntarily adopt pollution prevention practices.

**Governor O'Malley Signs Legislation to Deter Illegal Fishing** Governor Martin O'Malley signed three new bills into law which will impose more serious penalties for fishing law violations in Maryland. This legislation will promote compliance with fishing regulations, give DNR greater enforcement tools and send a clear message to the public about the process of fishing license suspension.

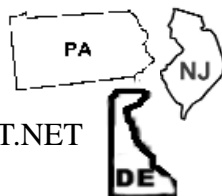
### Explore Maryland by Water

## Pennsylvania/ New Jersey / Delaware Legislative Report

### Change of Command

Rear Admiral Fred M Rosa Jr. Commander USCG Fifth District presided over change of Command. Captain David Scott Sector Commander Delaware Bay was relieved of command by Captain Meredith Austin on June 12th at the Union League of Philadelphia.

The change-of-command ceremony is a time-honored event preserved by the rich heritage of naval tradition. It is a custom that is formal and following military protocol is designed to strengthen the respect for the continuity of command that is vital to any military organization. The culmination of the ceremony is reached when both officers read their orders, face one another, salute and transfer responsibility for the command.

Coast Guard Capt. Meredith L. Austin is a native of Pomona, N.Y. She began her Coast Guard career by attending the Coast Guard Academy in New London, Conn., and received her commission in 1985. She holds a bachelor's degree in marine science, a master's degree in public health and industrial hygiene, and a master's degree in homeland security. Her Deputy Commander is Captain Gwyn R. Johnson.

### The Philadelphia City Planning Commission

approved two controversial zoning bills for the Central Delaware Riverfront - an overlay meant to be an interim set of guidelines for the Penn Praxis Vision and Action plans, and a remapping for the "Old City/Northern Liberties/Fishtown"

section of the Delaware, both introduced by City Councilman Frank DiCicco in March. The first bill is intended as a "stop-gap measure" to support the Penn Praxis goals until a fully detailed plan is created and delivered in final form. It would encompass the area bounded by Allegheny Avenue to the north, east to the river, Oregon Avenue to the south and Interstate 95 to the west.

The interim overlay would establish a 100-foot setback for future development (or 10 percent of the total lot area, whichever is less), to allow for park space, jogging and biking trails and ecological concerns - though it allows for "exigent circumstances." It also mandates public waterfront access points, to be provided at a width of 12 feet on piers and 25 feet at all other locations.

The second bill changes the zoning designations in the area from Berks Street in Fishtown, south to Market Street in Old City. And also hemmed by the river and I-95.

The bills are to be considered together. They have gathered pros and cons. Real estate attorney Michael Sklaroff and the developer and former city planning chief Craig Schelter were protesting the bills. According to Sklaroff a zoning stop-gap measure does not exist. He stated "It is almost inconceivable to me that under our City Charter and due process to have this kind of subjective decisions on zoning, where the Planning Commission has complete discretion,"

The economy and credit markets will dictate which direction the planning will go, but in the meantime, "We believe we do need the interim legislation," Planning Commission Executive Director Alan Greenberger said, to mitigate the kind of negative development "that has plagued the waterfront to this date."

### **Delaware River Day at Penn's Landing**

was held on Sunday, May 24, 2009 from 12:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. at the Penn's Landing Marina located directly behind the Independence Seaport Museum on Columbus Blvd. at Walnut Street. Delaware River Day was a FREE event with fun and interactive activities such as free kayaking, life jacket fitting, and a PFD fashion show presented by Ship 484 featuring the latest in water related gear, demonstrations, musical entertainment, face painting for the kids, fishing, and vessel tours. The PFD'S were furnished by Philadelphia Boat Supply, Sterns Coleman, BoatUS and Eastern Aero Marine. Sterns donated the PFD'S for a raffle by Ship 484.

### **Proposed for Boating Advisory Board (BAB) June 9th Meeting**

BAB Consideration of Commission Agenda items up for final rulemaking. The complete amendments were published in the May Chartroom Chatter. To pass boating laws you have to go thru a series of redundant requirements. The amendments are first proposed by the Pennsylvania Boating Advisory Board (BAB) and accepted. The proposed amendments were submitted to the PA Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC) and were accepted. Now BAB has to accept the findings of the Commission and it will be sent to the legislated bodies to become law.

- a. Amendments to the Section 53.8 (Boats) and Section 97.1 (Personal Flotation Devices).
- b. Amendment to Section 91.5 (Parental and Boat Owner Responsibility).
- c. Amendment to Section 101.5 (Confidentiality of Boating Accident Reports).
- d. Amendment to Section 105.3 (Unacceptable Boating Practices).
- e. Amendment to Section 109.1 (Air Boats).
- f. Amendment to Section 109.6 (Special Marine Events).

- g. Amendment to Section 111.17 (Clearfield County).
- h. Amendment to Section 111.20 (Crawford County).

HB 320 Haluska (PN 352) Amends Title 30 OBJECTION SENT MAY 10th  
 This bill was passed by the house and goes to the Senate

The Pennsylvania Boating Association (PBA) objected to the House Bill and sent notices to the Senate.

The Pennsylvania Boating Association representing all Pennsylvania Boaters would appreciate the Senate to vote to amend HB 320 Haluska (PN 352) & Amend Title 30 (Fish) repealing provisions granting commissioners the powers of waterways patrolmen. "The primary responsibility of a waterways conservation officer is the enforcement of the code and this part. Section 901(a)(12) of the code (relating to powers and duties of waterways conservation officers and deputies) authorizes waterways conservation officers, when acting within the scope of their employment, to pursue, apprehend, or arrest a person suspected of violating 18 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Crimes Code) or another offense classified as a misdemeanor or felony." The waterway patrolmen are spread thinly throughout the state. Commissioners are quite aware of the fish and boating laws and without pay have been supplementing the tasks of waterways conservation officers appropriately. Taking away their deputized powers does not help the waterways patrolmen.

## **NEW JERSEY**

### **Vessels That Do Not Require Registration in New Jersey**

1. Boats registered in another state and not being used in New Jersey for more than 180 days
2. Boats owned by the United states, a solitary state, a county, or a municipality
3. Boats registered in another country temporarily plying in New Jersey waters
4. Racing boats brought into the State for racing or with permit from the New Jersey State Police
5. A ship's lifeboat
6. Any boat that is propelled only by oars or paddles, less than 12 feet long
7. A sailboat without a motor, sailing only on private waters
8. Surfboards, sailboards, inflatable's, canoes and kayaks

## **DELAWARE**

Delaware state law makes it the easiest state in the country to register a boat. According to the U.S. Coast Guard, there were 61 boating accidents in Delaware in 2007 (2008 & 2009 data not available) and more than \$300,000 in property damage. Given that only about 10 percent of accidents are reported to authorities, the tally is probably even higher. 12 steps you can take to prevent unnecessary dangers and prepare for unforeseen hazards.

- Check weather forecasts.
- File a plan and let someone know where you are going and returning.
- Check boat, equipment, balance, engine and fuel before leaving.
- Observe all nautical rules of the waterways.
- Carry easily accessible fire extinguishers.
- Do not overload the boat.
- Do not stand up or shift weight in a small boat.
- Do not allow riding on the bow, seatbacks or gunwales.
- Equip the boat with navigation lights, whistle or horn and safety kit.

- Keep alert around other watercraft and swimming.
- Do not mix drinking and boating.
- Make sure every person wears a life jacket.

### Comments to EPA on Ethanol Increase now over 27,000

In defiance of the ethanol producers, the boating community has submitted 27,253 comments to the EPA in opposition to increasing ethanol from E10 to E15. The producers petitioned the EPA for a waiver to increase ethanol levels to E15 causing the EPA to invite public comment. Meanwhile, as reported by Boat US, a group of Florida boaters has filed a class action suit against the oil companies for negligence in not warning them of the effects of ethanol on boat engines and gas tanks. The EPA has extended the comment period to July, so all who have not submitted comments are encouraged to do so at [www.NMMA.org](http://www.NMMA.org) and click on Action Alert.

### America's Waterway Watch (AWW) to be Expanded

Senator Susan Collins plans to introduce legislation to provide increased funding and expand the scope of the AWW program. The legislation establishes the AWW program within the DHS to promote voluntary reporting of suspected terrorist activity or suspicious behavior and to provide for the coordination of watch programs within Federal, State and local law enforcement agencies. NBF suggested the expansion of the AWW in response to the perceived threat by the USCG from small vessels at the recent Small Vessel Security Summit. A letter of support has been sent to Senator Collins from NBF and NASBLA on this proposed legislation.
